Belle is the President of the Reparations Labor Union, the co-chair of the Detroit Chapter of the National Coalition of Blacks for Reparations in America (NCOBRA), a member of NCOBRA's National Board of Directors, the Group Leader of the Detroit Chapter of the Green Party, a member of the Charles H. Wright Museum of African-American History, a member of the Isaac Agree Downtown Synagogue, a member of the Temple of Forbidden Knowledge (about the *Medu Neter*), and a member of the Urban Information Network. A native Detroiter, she graduated

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Henry Ford High School and Wayne State University, and holds a law degree from the University of Florida.

["Defending and Securing Civil Rights for LGBTQ and Other Michiganders," a guest presentation by Dana Nessel,](#) one of the premier litigators of LGBTQ issues in Michigan. In 2010, Ms. Nessel brought the matter of Harmon v. Davis, in which a Michigan court, for the first time, held that a non-biological parent in a same-sex couple could establish custodial rights to the couple's children. Ms. Nessel also successfully petitioned for the first second-parent adoptions for same-sex couples in Oakland and Wayne Counties. She has defended and acquired exonerations for scores of defendants wrongly targeted for prosecution based on sexual orientation, and has represented various clients terminated from employment based upon sexual orientation or gender identity.

In 2012, she spearheaded the precedent-setting case DeBoer v. Snyder, which challenged the bans on adoption and marriage for same-sex couples in Michigan. DeBoer was later consolidated with its affiliated Sixth Circuit cases into Obergefell v. Hodges in the United States Supreme Court. This landmark case legalized same-sex marriage nationwide. In 2014, Ms. Nessel, along with her co-counsel on DeBoer, was honored with the "Champion of Justice" award by the Michigan State Bar Association. In 2015, she was designated as "Woman of the Year" by Michigan Lawyers Weekly. Ms. Nessel is also an officer for Fair Michigan, an organization dedicated to the equal protection of women and LGBT residents under the Michigan Constitution.

What most American Jews don't know is that this event was not a universally accepted fact in Israel. The *Etzel* (the *Irgun*) actually attempted to overthrow the government.

Natan Fuchs' own family was split during this brief period, with his uncle on board the *Altalena*, the ship that brought armaments for the *Irgun*, while his father and other soldiers in the new IDF fired on the ship from the beach in Tel Aviv. Natan's talk involves personal memoirs—his own and his family's—of those events.

Humanists are frequently challenged to justify our assertion that we can be good without God. This should not surprise us. Though our philosophy is gaining traction, our convictions still deviate from the reigning ethos.

We were reminded of that by a Pew study released just this week. Americans were asked to choose which traits would most strongly dissuade them from supporting a presidential candidate. Of sixteen choices, atheism took first place.

Now part of this is related to the word itself. While Humanism communicates a positive outlook, the A-word connotes only godlessness. For most people, that's a synonym for immorality. But it's not just the sound of the word.

The plain fact is that most Americans continue to believe that God (specifically the Judeo-Christian version) is indispensable for distinguishing between right and wrong. Otherwise, we risk tumbling into a black hole of moral relativism where anything goes.

We know they're wrong so we usually refuse to engage in such debates. But ignoring them will not suffice. Theistic moral absolutists have produced some quite sophisticated-sounding arguments. We have an obligation to evaluate - and challenge - their claims.

During Shabbat services Rabbi Falick addresses some of these arguments. The next time someone asserts that morality is dependent on God, you will be better supplied with an answer.


